


Objects in the Mirror are Closer than they Appear

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
On Resistance and Dignity

The choice of resistance as a central concept in an educational project that aims to give educators and students the tools to depolarize difficult conversations may seem odd - even misguided. Resistance is a concept that is inherently political, bringing to mind angry confrontations and possibly even threatening or at least undesired disruptions to the "peacefulness" of our daily lives. As teachers, many of us also enter into, or avoid altogether, difficult conversations in fear of triggering a resistant student who makes an aggressive outburst that derails the conversation and perhaps does harm to others. While we can all think of acts of resistance that have profoundly inspired us to the potential of positive change and the courage of the human spirit, the concept and practice of resistance is ambivalent. lit should not be assumed that it is being used for ethical purposes and the tactical choices made by resistors may be poor ones that cause harm to those on all sides. With that being said, though, resistance is an inherently human act, linked to our desire for respect and autonomy, and as such, those engaging in it deserve our consideration... During our October study break, a group of faculty from 6 departments - Biomedical Laboratory Technology, Diagnostic Imaging, Radiation Oncology, Nursing, Physiotherapy Technology and Social Services – met to plan for a November 11th symposium, where their third-year students can learn with, from and about each other. The day is the result of a 2-year ECQ-funded Interprofessional Education (IPE) project, led by Tim Miller and Krista Bulow, both from Physiotherapy Technology, and Marie-Eve Dufour from Social Services, that aims to create spaces where meaningful interactions and solid relationships can develop to help graduating health professionals meet the challenges of working in a stressful, multidisciplinary environment. 
