



Do you have a goal for the lesson and is it standards based?



You're not quite there yet! UDL is all about "firm goals, flexible means," and requires a clear goal to design options and choice for even in remote learning.

Specifically stating the goal of the lesson, up front, will assist you in tailoring the resources, activities and assessments to the goal and make it easier for your students to proceed through the lesson.

Have vou provided options & choices to support selfregulation for learners (i.e, daily schedules, scaffolds if confused/ rustrated, options for breaks, mindfulness activities, etc.)

Have you created a rubric or clear grading criteria that makes it clear how students can be successful on both formative and summative assessment?

You're not quite there yet! One of the best ways to diminish the distance between us in a remote situation if to provide multiple options for our students to continue to work together both virtually and at a social

Options for group work can be virtual or physical and still be socially distant. You should provide for both technical and non-technical opportunities.

Providing multiple means of engagement, representation and action and expression that are based upon what you know your students need will ensure that all students will have an opportunity to take responsibility for their education and deal with frustration, anxiety. and challenge.

You have to address any cultural differences in order to make sure that all students will feel connected to the lesson.
